

[Following is the Preface to the pamphlet issued in 1887.]

P R E F A C E.

In the compilation of the following sketch the principal source of information has been the Town Registers. Copies of the records of over forty towns have been obtained from town clerks, the largest number of names being found at Wrentham. The marriage of the original Robert and the births of all his children are found at Dedham, and the descendants of his five sons can be followed for many years in an unbroken line in the records of Wrentham, Needham and Franklin. As the numbers increase, however, the difficulty of identification becomes greater, for until the present century, except in the births, the name of the parent is seldom given. At this point, then, family traditions and records become indispensable, and thanks are due to all those who have kindly assisted to make this record as complete as it is. Many of the omissions are due to the failure of various persons, town clerks and others, to respond to letters of inquiry.

In one case only has the information been derived wholly from private sources. Samuel³ (No. 15) disappeared early from the Wrentham records, and no trace of him could be found. It was only by accident that a descendant was discovered in the West, and by this means a tolerably complete record of that branch has been obtained. To this branch belongs a member of the fifth generation, Thomas Ware* of Granville, Ill., now in his eighty-first year. As he was born the day his grandfather, Samuel,³ died, two lives carry us back to within eighteen years of the lifetime of the first Robert; and if Robert had lived until 1717, as the father of six such long-lived sons as Ebenezer² and his five brothers might well have done, three lives would cover the whole period since the first settlement of

the country. The average age of these six men was more than eighty years, and one of them lived to be ninety-seven.

In the course of this investigation a good deal of material has been collected, including not only some names which bring several branches down to the present time and others which have not yet been fitted into their proper place, but also wills, deeds and personal records and anecdotes for which there was no room in this brief outline.* One instance may be given: Eleazer Wood, father of Hannah Ware (page 18), was scalped by the Indians during the attack on Medfield, 1675-6, when a boy of fourteen. He survived, and afterwards married, but was "subject to mental aberrations" and died early. His descendants may here find a clue to eccentricities which have hitherto puzzled them. There is a tradition that the great-grandson who named his daughter *China*, would have named his son *Crockery* if his wife had not protested. Is not the cause of this freak to be looked for in the disaster that befel young Eleazer Wood as he and his brother were yoking their oxen that dim, cold February morning? Emerson says, "Every man is a bundle of his ancestors." We are what our ancestors have made us, and our descendants will be what their ancestors make them.

Whether this additional material is ever preserved in a more permanent form will depend largely upon the interest taken by the various members of the family in supplying the necessary further information, and also upon the demand for so expensive a work as this would be. The present sketch comes down late enough for almost any one to discover to which branch he himself belongs.

INTRODUCTORY NOTE.

FROM the year 1887, when the Register article and the Pamphlet saw the light, till October, 1898, when her pen was finally laid down, Miss Ware did a very large amount of most careful work in gathering and compiling the annals of the family. She then felt that her task was practically completed, and longed for time and strength to see it in type.

Those who loved her most have not been willing that her noble endeavor should fail of its purpose, nor that the friends* who had coöperated with her should lose their joint "labor of love." For this reason the present publication is made; wherein Miss Ware's collections and writings concerning Wares and the children¹ of Ware mothers are printed with the fewest possible changes of phrase or form. Her valuable notes upon Wares whose relation to the Dedham family was not proven, are placed in the Appendix for further study by those most interested. The article upon Wares in England has been compiled by another hand while the genealogy was passing through the press.

ENGLISH NOTES.

Compiled by the publisher chiefly from documents copied by Mrs. Francis B. Troup,
Offwell House, Honiton, Eng.

THE county of Devon, from which many of the settlers of Maine and New Hampshire, a large part of the earliest inhabitants of Dorchester, and many other pioneers came, has been for centuries the home of numerous persons bearing the name Ware (in its various forms).

In deeds relating to the parish of St. Mary Arches, in the city of Exeter, land was conveyed 1 August, in the tenth year of king Edward IV [1471] by Thomas Weir, son and heir of Robert Weir of Exeter.

Richard Were, of Honiton Clyst, made his will 1 January, 4 Edward VI [1550]; minor sons Thomas and Edward; in case of their death before the age of 18, bequest to go to son John; to his father (who is sick) a gown that is at Exeter; residue to wife Joan and son John; mentions brother Edward. [Dean and Chapter].

John Weare, of Sowton, husbandman; will, 1583. To poor of Pinhoe and of Clist Honiton; wife Elizabeth; son Edmund under 21; dau. Margaret and Dorothy and son William Weare; father Edmond Weare. Overseers, John Pyne of Heavitree, Thomas Weare of Holbrook (Clist Honiton), William Ayton. [Archd. of Ex.]

Edmund Weare, yeoman, will dated 8 December, 1584. Wife Ailee; son Thomas; children of son John; Grace, dau. of son in law Jherome Cheriton; children of sons in law John Hill, Henrie Coose and Richard Jervis; stewart, Henrie Weare; maid servant, Marie Hechman; Dennys Clerke, maid servant to son in law Gilbert Ponsford. Overseers, James Coose, Thomas Weare, my son, and Henrie Coose; witnesses Jherome Cheriton, clarke, Thomas Ware, James Peryam and John Lympanie. [Archd. of Ex.]

In Woodbury, Robert Warre and Christian Yeele were married 16 April, 1557.

Robert Weare and Joan Follett were married at St. Mary Arches, Exeter, 10 April, 1627. Robert Weare of Clist Honiton and Charity Carter of Pynhowe were licensed to marry at Exeter June 2, 1628; and Robert Weare of Ottery St. Mary and Thomasin, daughter of Anthony Butt of the same were licensed February 7, 1630-1.

Robert Weare of Whitstone, tailor, made his will Dec. 20, 1622; probated 25 March, 1623. Bequeathed to wife Joane, son Thomas, granddaughter Joane, daughter of son Thomas.

Robert Weare of Clyst Honiton made will 27 December, 1632. Begs his wife Joan to be a good mother to his children; bequeaths to son William best cloak and coat, and certain specified articles after the death of wife; daughter Elizabeth had made over certain rights in lands before

her decease; daughters Jane, Joane, Dorothy and Katharine, all minors; son *Robert Weare*, a minor, to have lands at Farringdon, which are to revert to daughter Dorothy if he die before marriage. Cousin John Michell, William Bishopp, ffraunce Waldron and brother Nathaniel Weare, overseers. Witnesses, John Waldron, Nathaniel Weare and John Weare. Signed (with mark); seal, a *fleur de lis*. Inventory of Robert Weare the elder, who dyed the 7 day of November, 1633, made by William Bishopp, Nathaniel Weare and William Weare. Total 388 li. Proved 4 December, 1633.

Robert Weare the elder, late of Ottery, administration of his estate was granted October 29, 1646, to James Batt, during the minority of the children Robert, Roger and ffraances; bond by James Batt, yeoman, and Tristram Stoning, tanner, of Honiton. Witnesses, Matthew Bennett and Nicholas Pigeon. [Archd. Ex.]

Topsham, March 14, 1643, Hannah, dau. of Robert Ware and Elizabeth his wife, was baptized.

John, son of Roger and Christian Ware, bapt. 6 October, 1639; John, son of Henry and Sarah Ware, bapt. 28 December, 1639; John son of George and Dorothee Ware, bapt. 6 October, 1640; Margaret, daughter of John and Mary Ware, bapt. 13 October, 1640; John, son of John Ware, bapt. 5 March, 1642. [Ottery St. Mary.]

The following parish registers in Devonshire have been searched for traces of our man: Honiton Clyst, Farringdon, Ottery St. Mary, Silverton, and Feniton; and all wills and admins. which seemed likely to bear upon the subject; but no positive evidenee in the case has been discovered.

The identification of "Robert Weare" is not a simple matter. The residence of the bridegroom of 1627 is not stated, though it might be inferred to have been St. Mary's, as the marriage took place there. The groom of 1628 is located at Clist Honiton; but the man of this parish whose will we have here calls his wife Joan; he also has at least two children who must have been born as far back as 1611, since Elizabeth has made a deed of land and William is treated as "of age." The records do not tell us whether these were first or second marriages. The son Robert and four daughters are certainly under 21 years of age, but the dates of their birth can not be ascertained, since the parish registers of Honiton Clist are wanting till the year 1683.

The absence of the names of Robert's children at Ottery indicates that they were born before 1635; which points back to the marriage with Thomasin Butt in 1630. This would show the two Roberts exhibited in these Probate records as entirely separate men, each having a minor son Robert at the date of his death; of these juniors one was still a minor in 1646, four years after our pioneer was on Massachusetts soil; but the other was living in 1632, with a bequest which sounds as if he were well grown. And it is a natural inquiry whether this Honiton Clist youth may not have become the Dedham planter.

WARES IN ESSEX, KENT AND LONDON.

FROM printed transcripts of diocesan and parish records we extract the following items relating to the family in the Eastern part of England.

William Ware of Dengie, co. Essex, and Margaret Smith of Bradwell juxta Mare, said co., widow of —— Smith of Boston, co. Lincoln, husbandman, were licensed by the bishop of London to marry at Br. March 9, 1584-5.

Thomas Ware, clerk, of Orsett, co. Essex, and Mary Deweye of St. Lawrence, Old Jewry, London, widow of Henry Deweye of same parish, leather seller; license issued Dec. 2, 1589. The same gentleman was licensed Nov. 28, 1595, to marry Mary Kelly of Stepney, Middx., widow of Thomas Kelly, gent. of same parish.

John Ware and Elizabeth Meare of Ospringe, co. Kent, were licensed by bishop of Canterbury Dec. 8, 1578, to marry at St. Margaret's, Canterbury.

Elizabeth Ware, widow, of Ospringe, Kent, had license from bishop of Canterbury May 9, 1582, to marry Robert Sowget of same parish.

Elizabeth Ware, now of the city of London, widow of William Ware, late of Chidingstone, co. Kent, was licensed by bishop of London March 25, 1586, to marry John Bucklande, yeoman, at St. Antholin's, London; married same day.

Edward Ware of Staplehurst, yeoman, and Susanna Crowch, of Lydd, co. Kent, were licensed by bishop of Canterbury June 10, 1612, to marry at Burmarsh or Sellinge. Edward Ware of Staplehurst, clothier, bachelor, aged about 23, at his own government, was licensed by bp. of Cant. Sept. 21, 1621, to marry Amy Borden of Headcorn, maiden, about 19, dau. of Matthew B. of same parish, dec. and now in gov. of her mother Joan Borden, widow, who consents.

Margaret Ware, widow of Peter Ware, haberdasher, was licensed by bp. of London Nov. 4, 1623, to marry William Plowman, haberd. of Crooked Lane, Lond.; married at St. Michael's, Cornhill, Nov. 5; called "of St. Michael's, Crooked Lane".

Grissell Ware of Rayleigh, co. Essex, 30, widow of Anthony Ware, Esq. of the same, was licensed by bp. of London June 11, 1639, to marry Richard Hoper, Esp., of Lincoln's Inn, London, bachelor, 35; married at St. Mary. Woolnoth two days later.

Registers of the parishes referred to (and not yet examined) are extant from dates here following: Dengie, 1725; Orsett, 1669; Chedingstone, 1558; Rayley, 1548; St. Michael's, Crooked Lane, 1539; Bradwell by the sea, 1558; Staplehurst, 1538. No wills of persons here mentioned have yet been seen.

It is not unlikely that the family was found in other parts of England at the period of the making of New England; quite probably a careful search of parish registers and wills may result in the discovery of some positive evidence of the birthplace and parentage of Robert of Dedham or of others of the name who came early to our country.

WARE GENEALOGY.

1.

"**ROBERT WARE**," as he signed his name, though called in public records by several different forms of the name, came from his English home to the colony of Massachusetts Bay some time before the autumn of 1642. The earliest date at which the name in any form occurs on the Dedham Records, is Nov. 25, 1642; when "Robert Weares is Admitted to the purchase of Thomas Eames his house lott and three acres of land."

The following items from the Dedham records show that this lot was on the "Great" or Dedham Island, and it probably became Robert Ware's house lot. Henry Deengaine had a house lot on the Great Island. June, 1640, Henry Wilson and Samuel Bullen were granted a parcel of land in the corner beneath and next to Deengaine. September, 1640, Thomas Eames was granted the parcel, four acres of upland, formerly granted to Henry Wilson and Samuel Bullen, next Mr. Deengayne's lot on the Great Island. This lot was bounded N. by waste; E. by swamp meadow; S. by Thomas Eames his swamp; W. by the highway. November, 1641, Henry Aldridge bought the northerly two acres of Thomas Eames his lot. December, 1641, Thomas Eames, Henry Deengaine, Austin Kalem, etc., were granted each two acres of swamp lying in the end of the swamp next the meadow in the Great Island. November, 1642, Robert Ware took the southerly two acres of Thomas Eames his lot; and also two acres of swamp south of it, which were bounded E. by waste swamp; S. by Austin Kalem; and W. by Henry Deengaine. The only highway at this time on the Island was the road leading from Cart Bridge (on Bridge Street) to the Great Causeway at the south end of Long Ditch, together with a small piece which, starting from near the bridge, curved to the east and north back into the other road at Ware's Causeway. [The northerly half of this curved road now forms part of Ames Street.] Robert Ware's house lot was probably at or near his Causeway.

A grant of land was made to him "6. 12. 1642," (6 February, 1642-3).

Various other grants were made to him of land in different parts of the town; on Dedham Island, and (in what was afterwards Needham), on Rosemary meadow brook, on the Great Plain, and near Magus Hill, etc. One lot of "three roods and twenty rod, more or lesse," was the second lot east from the N. E. corner of Webster Street and Great Plain Avenue in Needham. The localities mentioned can be found in the "Atlas of Norfolk Co., Mass.", Comstock & Cline, New York, 1876. See also Mann's Annals of Dedham.

Robert Ware joined the church at the time of the baptism of his eldest child, October 2 or 11, 1646. He was made freeman May 26, 1647; was member of the Artillery Company in 1644. He lived and died in Dedham, though three of his sons—John, Nathaniel and Robert—removed to Wollomonopoag, set off in 1661, incorporated as Wrentham in 1673. His name stands second in point of wealth on the tax list.

"Robert Wares" married first in Dedham "Margaret Huntinge 24, 1, 1645" (March 24, 1644-5),* daughter of John Hunting, first ruling elder of the Dedham church, and his wife Esther Seaborn. Margaret, the mother of all his children, died in Dedham, Augnst 26, 1670; and Robert "Weare" married second, May 3, 1676, **Hannah Jones** (b. March 28, 1636, d. April 20, 1721), daughter of Thomas Jones of Dorchester. The following inscription is in the old Dorchester burying ground: "Here Lyes Buried | Ye Body of Hannah | Ware y^e Widdow | of Robert Ware | Aged 84 years | Departed this Life | y^e 20th day of April | 1721."

In her will, dated Jan. 21, 1720-1, proved May 1, 1721, she leaves legacies to "M^{rs} Esther Man, Widow of the Rev^d Mr. Man, late pastor of the Church of Christ at Wrentham," £5; "to the church of Dedham for to buy a Cup for the Commuunion Table £5;" to sons in law Robert & Nathaniel Ware; to Hannah Baker Dau. of Ebenezer Jones; to Mehitable Newel Dau. of my Brother Jones; to the Widow Elizabeth Metcalf; to my cousin Esther Flatingham of Boston; to my cousin Elizabeth Crocker £20 and £10 due from my sister Green deceased; Kinsman Thomas Crocker; Rebecah Green daughter of James Green late of Boston; the Surviving Daughter of Richard Green. Executors to sell a meadow bought of Joseph Fairbanks, giving the first profer of it to Son in law Samuel Ware; also land in Dorchester, "Giving Kinsmen Ebenezer Jones & Jonathan Jones the first Profer of them." After all Debts & legacies are paid the remainder of the Estate to be divided into five parts; one fifth each to John Green, Samuel Green, Elizabeth Crocker, Esther Flatingham; one Tenth part to Jonathan Jones; and one Tenth to Jonathan Clap in trust

for Sarah, wife of Jonathan Jones. "But before the Division of my Estate into Fifth Parts my Will is if my Nephew Jonathan Jones shall faithfully deliver Me the money I Delivered Him to keep for Me, Or in Case of my Death shall render a True Account upon Oath thereof to my Executors Hereafter Named as being part of my Estate, and Shall not Demand any thing for my Board, Maintenance or Other Charges at His House, . . . I do give and Bequeath to Him . . . and His heirs My Two Acres of Salt meadow on the East Side of little Neck in Dorchester. And unto Sarah his Present Wife . . . Fourty Shillings as particular legacies." Deacon Jonathan Clap and Sergeant Ebenezer Clap Executors.

Witnesses: Elijah Danforth, Joshua George, Preserved Capen.

Ebenezer and Jonathan Jones were children of her brother Isaac; Richard, John and Samuel Green of her sister Rebecca, wife of James Green.

"Robert Ware the Aged" died in Dedham, April 19, 1699. His will, made February 25, 1698, was proved May 11, 1699. The inventory, taken May 3, was £250, 2, 10.

WILL OF ROBERT WARE OF DEDHAM.

In the year of our Lord one Thousand six hundred Ninety eight nine, the twenty fift day of February, I Robert Ware of Dedham, in the County of Suffolk in his Ma^{ties} Collony in the Massachusetts bay in New England, being put in mind of my great ehanc, by age, & the infirmities thereof, according to my duty, I do hereby, in the time of my life, & in the injoym^t of my understanding make, ordayne & declare this to be my last will and Testam^t, for the disposeing and setleing of those things of my Estate, which the Lord he betrusted me with, wherein first, I comit my precious soul into the hands of almighty Go^t, in and through the Lord Jeeses christ, my most blessed Redemer, & my body to the earth to be therin interred in christian buryall at the discretion of my executor^s heerin heorafter named. / Imp^rs I do heerby gine unto my Deare and well beloved wife Hannah ware the use & impronem^t of the East end of my dwelling house & the north end of my barne & halfe my orchard & one third part of my pasture land near my house & at y^e north end of the Island planting feild, & one third part of my lot that I purchased of John Keelum y^t is fenceed in pertickular, & halfe my broad meadow that lye betwixt the lands of John Eaton & the widdow Kingsberry, & one horse beast, and as much household stuff as she stand in need of, for her use all the tearme of her materall life, all those things aforres^d and the Twenty pounds of money, she haue received, for her to dispose of as she se cause, & my son Samuel is to prouid her wood fit for the fier at all times what she shall need, & he to be paied out of my estate what is just, also I gine unto my loueing wife y^e use and impronem^t of two acres of land y^t is broken up wher Samuel haue a part neer magnus hill. Furthermore my mind & will is that each of my children shall haue equall portions in my estate excepting my son John Ware who is to haue Twenty pound more then a single portion, & what I haue giuen to each of my children formerly as it is set donne in my book is to be acompt-

ed to each of them as a part of there portion, and for most of my lands I do denide them amongst my three sons in Dedham, and what they, or any of them shall haue more than there equall portions they must make good paym^t for the same to my executo^{rs} within the space of four yeares after my & my wifes decease for them to pay them that want y^e makeing up of ther portions as followeth:—

Item. I giue unto my Son Sammel Ware & to his Heirs & Assignes foreuer the west end of my dwelling house and the South end of my bearn, and my new bearn, and my shop, and halfe my oarchard, & two parts of three of all my pasture land, neer my house, & Greens lot, & two thirds of all my land at the north end of y^e Island planting feild, & two parts of three of y^e land I purchased of John Keelum, & a quarter part of my broad meadow, & my foule meadow, & all my swamps near my house, and about Greens lot, & my swamp neer south playne, & my land at the clap-bord trees, more, fine acres of woodland near to meadfeild way, as it abut on Joseph Wights lot, more, I gine unto him halfe of that land I bought of M^r Dwight near to magns hill abuteth on y^e Lands of widdow Metcalfe west & Jn^o Eaton east, more, one third part of my land at y^e stamping place, & one third part of my land at chesnut hill, & halfe my land at magns hill within fence, & halfe my land on the north side of my fenced land & after y^e decease of my deare wife, Samuel my Son is to haue all my houssing & all my oarchards, & all the land near my house, uplands & swamps, Greens lot, & all my swamps about it, & all my lands at y^e north-erly end of planting feild, meadow & upland as it abutteth on the east on charles riuier & y^e pond north, And all my meadow and upland y^t is fenced in with Eleazer Kingsberys lands near Vine Rock & halfe my broad meadow, and four cow comon Rights.

Item. I giue unto my son Epherim & to his Heirs & assignes foreuer, that land I purchased of M^r Dwight y^t abut on his house lot east, & halfe my land near magns hill within fence, and halfe my land one the north side of my land fenced in, & all my Small parecls of meadow near it, & one third part of my land at the stamping ground, and one third part of my land at chesnut hill & three cow comon Rights & one fourth part of broad meadow & after the decease of my wife, one third part, & all my children shall haue equall share in my lot at the great eader swamp.

Item. I giue unto my son Ebenezer Ware & to his Heirs and assignes foreuer all my Land as it lyeth abutting upon Daniels swamp meadow east, Samuel Parker north, more, one parcell of land a little distant from his house lot towards the east, by Jn^o Woodcocks land more one third part of my land at the stamping ground, more a third part of my land at chesnut hill, & after my wifes decease a third part of my broad meadow, & three cow comon Rights.

Item. I giue unto my children at Wrentham onwards there portions to be equally denide betwixt them all my moneables, cattell & household stuf what my wife can spare, & my clothes & all debts due to me & eight acres of Land I purchased of Henery Brock & Lambert Gimery as it lyeth in the Island planting feild, more, three acres of land I purchased of Thomas Eames abutting on Jn^o Woodcocks, after the decease of my wife the household stuff she haue to use, to be equally denide amongst them.

It is my mind and will is that my houses and lands near home may be low prised, & the lands in planting feild, being poor lands & require much

fenceing, I do apoint & impower my well beloned sons John Ware, Robert Ware & Samuel Ware to be the executo^{rs} of this my last will and Testam^t & I request and impower my louing friends Deacon Thomas Metcalfe, Deacon William Anery, & Deacon Joseph Wight to be y^e ouerseers or superuisers to determin any differences that may arise from or betwixt any persons concerned in this my last will, & what they or two of them if any dye y^e surviving determin shall be of full force at any & all times & care must be taken for to recompence y^e executo^{rs} & ouerseers.

To confirme this my last will and testament I haue hereunto set to my hand & seale y^e date afores^d.

Notes on the Will of Robert Ware.

Island planting field.—Dedham Island, just north of Dedham village, formed by a bend in Charles River and the “Long Ditch” which unites the upper and the lower parts of the stream. It is about a mile and three quarters from north to south, and three quarters of a mile from east to west, and contains about 1200 acres. The “Planting field plain” is in the northern part of the Island. The “Long Ditch,” about half a mile long, part of which is now the boundary between Dedham and Needham, was cut through the *Broad Meadows* in 1653. The “Great Causeway” is a narrow strip of land about quarter of a mile long, along the river on the S. W. of Broad Meadows; on this a road was laid out in 1644. “Ware’s Causeway” is a small part of the road leading from the Great Causeway to Cart Bridge, on the western side of the Island.

Magus Hill is in the northern part of Needham (now Wellesley), just east of the Wellesley Hills station on the B. & A. R. R. The reservoir is on the summit. In 1681, John Magus and Sarah Magus, Indians, gave to the town of Dedham a deed of a tract of land lying within Dedham bounds, bounded N. by Watertown and Natick (now Weston), W. and S. W. by a line running from the mouth of Rosemary Meadow Brook on the N. E. to the mouth of Natick Brook on the S. W. Natick Brook runs through the two ponds in the western part of Wellesley, south into Charles River. It joins Dewing Brook near its mouth. The rest of what is now Needham, S. E. of this tract, had been deeded to Dedham the previous year by William Nahaton (Nehoiden) and his brothers.

Fowle Meadow.—“Fowle meadows” lie on the Neponset River in the eastern part of Dedham and in Canton.

South Playne borders on the edge of the swamp southward of Ridge Hill in the southern part of Dedham. *Clapboard trees* is in the S. W. part of Dedham east of Buckmaster pond: it originally included the eminence where the West Dedham Church stands, with the land adjoining on the north and east. *Stamping place* is supposed to be a herding place for cattle, and to have been situated approximately in the space now enclosed within Linden and Washington Streets at Wellesley Hills. Before the division of the common lands, the feeding grounds for cattle were called

“Herd Walks.” One of these was on Dedham Island; one on East Street, and the third on South Plain. *Chestnut Hill* is about half way between Magus Hill and North Hill, Needham. *Lands at the north end of planting field abutting on the pond north.* The pond is Cow Island Pond, formed by Charles River, just east of the northern end of Long Ditch. *Vine Rock* is on the eastern side of Dedham Island, on the western bank of the river, half way between Cow Island Pond and the entrance to Mother Brook. The bridge just north of it, over which the road passes from Dedham to West Roxbury is Vine Rock Bridge. The *Great Cedar Swamp* was in the part of Dedham now Walpole, between the Plain and South Walpole. History of Norfolk County, page 709, in the will of Eleazer Ware, 1750, is mentioned “a piece of Cedar Swamp lying in the Dedham Cedar swamp so called.”

Robert Ware’s sons in Wrentham, John, Nathaniel and Robert, seem to have received their land as a part of portion during their father’s lifetime.

The house of Ephraim,² essentially the same as formerly, is in Wellesley, on Oakland Street, opposite the end of Brookside Road. Photographs of this house (Nos. 445, 446) may be obtained of Holmes Bros., 19 Main St., Charlestown, Mass. The Indian Magus very probably lived near the spring which is just south of the house. The house of Ebenezer² was probably at the corner of Rosemary and Highland Streets, Needham. [C. W. Morton, on map.] Deacon Reuel lived and died in this house. The house of Josiah³ (Nathaniel²), and later of his son Joseph⁴, the journalist, stood, until 1886, on the north corner of Russell Place, just north of Ridge Hill in Needham (opposite “J. Cartwright”).

MARGARET, first wife of Robert Ware, the immigrant, was a daughter of John Hunting of Dedham, and probably came with her parents from England. Her mother, Esther (Hester) seems to

have been a sister of Francis Seaborne, who made a bequest to her in England, as we see by her will. She died 4 (3) 1676. "Elder John Hunting" survived her and died April 12, 1688, confirming bequests made by his wife, and mentioning son-in-law Robert Ware and other children. See Pioneers of Massachusetts.

ABSTRACT OF WILL OF HESTER HUNTING.

Will of Hester Hunting wife of John Hunting of Dedham dated January 4, 1675 proved Feb. 12, 1684-5.

After payment of debts, "unto my well beloved son John Hunting the whole & full sume of twenty pounds as his part of that Estate, Legacie or portion that was given to me by my loveing Brother Francis Seaborne in Old England, which Legaey is yet due to me to be paid as by my loveing Brother Francis Seaborn's will appeares in Old England amounting to the sume of fourty and five pounds," - - - "to my beloved son Samuel Hunting liveing in Charlstowne, the whole & full sume of ten pounds as his part & portion of the afores^d fourty & five pounds" - - - "to Hannah wife of my son Samuel afores^d one pair of new sheets & my best table cloth & to my grandchild Samuel Hunting (oldest son of my son Samuel afores^d) six napkins." "one fourth of s'd fifteen pounds remaining to my loving daughter Mary Buckner of Boston and also my best tany coat" - - - "unto the children of my daughter Ware deceased one fourth of s'd fifteen pounds to be equally divided between them all." - - - "to my loving daughter Hester Fisher of Dedham one fourth part of s'd fifteen pounds & my best goune." - - - "to Hester Peeke the daughter of my Son in law John Peck of Rehoboth one fourth part of s'd fifteen pounds & also my hat & my Stuff coat." - - - "to Mary Wood my maid servant my old red under-coate & my searge under coate & my cloth wescoat. And what remains undisposed of all my wearing apparel Lining & wooling I give to Elizabeth Hunting wife of my oldest son John Hunting of Dedham."

"Furthermore my mind & will is that my dear & wel beloved husband afores^d should have the full use and improvement of all the premises as long as he doth live excepting what things of my wearing Apparell he do see causs to give away to bee sooner disposed of to the person afores^d. Legacies in money to be paid within six months after the Decease of my dear husband if it be sent hither from Old England before, otherwise to be delivered presantly after it be sent over whenever it do come after my said Husbands decease, and if the whole sume afores^d of fourty & five pounds cannot be attained then so much thereof as can be attained shall be divided to the persons afores^d according to their severall proportions afores^d by abateing in each pound what the afores^d Sume shall fall short of fourty & five pounds."

The sons John Hunting and Samuel Hunting appointed Executors.

JOHN² WARE, born in Dedham, Oct. 6, 1646; died in Wrentham, April 7, 1718, in his 73d year. One of the settlers, 1671, of Wollomonopoag, incorporated as Wrentham 1673.* In March, 1675-6, the town was deserted by the settlers, who took refuge from the Indians in Dedham and elsewhere, and did not return till 1680. "1676—March Ye 30th Ye Inhabitance ware drawn of by rason of y^e Endien Worre." "1680—August Ye 21st. The Rev^d M^r Man returned to Wrentham again and divers Inhab^{nts}." (John, Nathaniel and Robert Ware among the number.) He is said to have built upon the "Bean Place"† as early as 1668. He was one of the first selectmen of Wrentham, 1686. Lieutenant and captain of the first military company.

John Ware's commission as Lieut. of the Foot Company of Militia in the town of Wrentham, signed by Gov. Stoughton, Aug. 5, 1696, is still extant. He seems to have served as lieutenant from 1689 to 1704, and as captain till 1715. The journal of the company was kept in a small book, six by four inches, written in a crabbed, almost indecipherable hand, and was filled with notices of musters, with the names and amount of fines of the absent and "defective"; the names of those "prest for Canada" or elsewhere, including those who "ran away," and the precautions taken against the Indians. At the end of the book are the following lines:—

"He that is wise will Learn to prize
an art that is most skillfull
but as for fools theyel Spoyl all Town
and Live not wise but willfull."

John² Ware headed a band of men in an attack against the Indians at Indian Rock during King Philip's war.—History of Nor-

folk County, p. 632. Indian Rock is near Jordan St. in the eastern part of Franklin.

John² married first in Dedham, Dec. 10, 1668, Mary, daughter of Michael Metcalf, Jr., and Mary Fairbanks (born Aug. 15, 1646, died in Dedham, March 22, 1676-7).

John² married second, March 24, 1678-9, Joanna, daughter of John and Joanna Gay, of Dedham, and widow of Nathaniel Whiting, Jr. (born March 23, 1644-5, died at Wrentham, Oct. 26, 1708).

John² married third, Dec. 21, 1709, Dorothy, widow* of Eleazer (Nicholas) Wood, of Sherborn (who had died May 20, 1704), and mother of Hannah Wood, wife of John's son Joseph. "Dorothy, widow of Capt. John Ware," died in Sherborn, December 10, 1728.

In the Name of god Amen. the last Will & testament of John Ware Senor of the town of Wrantham, in the County of Suffolk in the prouence of the Massetness bay in New England, being Crase and weke in bodey but Sound and Rite in understaning Remembiring my mortellity desireing to set my hous in order and so to dispose of such thing as god hase ginen me to God glorey and the good of mine do make and ordain this my last will and testament—imprimis, commet my Soul into the hands of Jesus Crist my only Medetor and my bodey to the grame to be desently beined by my exseentor hereafter to be nameed—the funerall charges and dets clerid Item I do gine and bequeth unto my well beloued Wife Dority Ware all and in Signalar what shee brout with herſ and more what houseſtuff & mouabels shee plesē to take—and one end of my dweling hous at her own coyse—and all the land one the Sonest Side of the hyway where the hous stand—paster, orchard, garden and more two acars one the Nor west side of the way whare Shee shall chouse, and more one half of my midow, at pin plain at her coys—the hous and lands to bee for her own use dureing the time of her widdhood. Itim to my son John Ware all those lands that he has Deeds on from me foreuer and other lands he is pursess on dureing his natrall life and aftir his desees to be denided equelly among his three sons—and all what hee hase resined that stans in book acount, and also to his children William—John—Moses and Mehetebell and Marey to be payed forty Shilling apece as they com of age by my executor—all my pissix (physic) books I gine to my son Benjemin all my other Books—after my wife hase taken out to be denided among all my children. Itim I gine to my son Benjemin Ware all the homstal, that part that is his mother in lawe dureing the time of her Widdhod, and my midow at gexpaster (Jack pasture)—and also to my grand Dafter Marey Blake† forty Shilling to be payd by my Executer. Itim. I gine to my gransons Willim, John and Moses Ware all that pece of land-licing Nor of Suthwise by bunge rode be it thirty acars more or less to be denided equelly betwen them all—the Remaining part of my estate to be equelly denided betweene my children namely Elezer—Joseph—Abbaguill—Maray and Hanah in that ech of them to gine an acount of what they hane alredy resued to make the

* *Crase.*—In “The Ancient Cnustoms of London,” printed 1670, we find:—“Now to debar him of all other Trades which are more befitting his crazy body, were somewhat unreasonable.” *Gex* (Jack) *pasture*, now the sight of the City Mills in the western part of Norfolk. *Bunge Road*.—*Bunge Brook*, a branch of Peter’s River, crosses the S W corner of Wrentham into Bellingham. In 1698 Lieut. John Ware, Lieut. ABSTRACT OF WILL OF JOHN GAY.

Will of John Gay of Dedham, dated Dec. 18, 1686, proved Dec. 17, 1689.

"Imprs unto my well beloved wife Joannah Gay all my Moveables within doors and without chattel & chattels whatsoever to be wholly at her own use for the comfert & support of her life." . . . "if my sayd wife have sufficient to maintain her with those things farther given unto her in this my will, then she have full power to make a legall will & dispose of the said moveables to her children as she please, to be delivered unto them after her decease, if she need not the Improvement or worth of the principall to maintain her in her life time." . . . "Also the full and free use of the South end of my dwelling house I now live in during the term of her naturall life and all the rent & revenues of my orchards and lands ingaged unto my selfe & unto her in a writeing under the hand and Seal of my Son John Gay, and the wintering of a Cow beast each year she live by my Son Jonathan Gay as under his hand & seal is ingaged.

Item, besides what my Loveing Son Samuel Gay have formerly had of me towards his portion I do farther add and give unto him the moyety or half part of those my Lands granted and laid out to me by Town of Dedham near Meadfeild bounds commonly called Meadfeild dividend." Gives unto his son Nathaniel Gay one half part of Lands granted & laid out to him in that division of Dedham lands near Medfeild, commonly called Medfeild dividend, and confirms a former gift of Land or whole common rights in all the Lands of Pecumtuck alies Derefield in Hampshire. Gives unto his son Eliezer Gay all his common rights in Wrentham Town in all divisions of Lands yet laid out of all sorts, and in those hereafter laid out in all the bounds of Wrentham whatsoever, also all the legal rights he has in all those lands that lieth in Dedham bounds betwixt Wrentham and Mendon bounds.

All that may remain after his decease & the decease of his wife undisposed of to be divided into twelve parts to be disposed of as followeth:— To his son Samuel Gay two of said twelve parts which with what he has already received to be his whole portion; to his son Nathaniel Gay two of said twelve parts which with what he has already received to be his whole portion; to his son Eleazar Gay one of said twelve parts which with what he has already received to be his whole portion; to his son in law John Ware one of said twelve parts in right of his daughter Joannah Ware his wife which with what he has already given them to be their whole portion; to his son in law John Fuller in right of his daughter Judah his wife three of said twelve parts, which with what he has already given them to be their whole portion; to his son in law Daniell Hawse in right of his daughter Abiell his wife three of said twelve parts which with what he has already given them to be their whole portion. Confirms Deed or conveyance of gift & sale to his son John Gay of all those houses & lands of all sorts and common rights dated Dec. 18, 1686. Witnesses Richard Ellice, Thomas Battle, Joseph Weight. Confirms deed of gift to his son Jonathan Gay of two Acres of land upon which his dwelling house stands in Dedham dated June 28, 1682. Witnesses Thomas Battle and Joseph Wight. Also another deed of one half Acre of his house lot with explaination of the former deed, said half Acre of land expressed in that deed Jonathan

Gay has sold to his brother John, which he approves of and confirms. Also confirms a deed given to his son Jonathan of all his uplands & meadows that lie adjoining or near to Andrew Dueings lands as bounded in said deed dated Dec. 1, 1686. Witnesse Thomas Battle, Joseph Wight, John Battelle and John Fisher.

All of which deeds he confirms on condition that the two Acres be at the use and Improvement of his Executrix and Executor to help towards the maintenance of his said wife. "My farther minde and will is that if the use and principall of what I have in this my will given to my dear and Loveing wife, together with the rents or yearly Income of my orchards or Lands prove not fully Sufficient for my said wifes comfertable maintenance, then so much as is farther needfull to be aded shall be taken or defrayed out of my Estate due to me by bonds under the hands and seals from my Sons John Gay and Jonathan Gay, and the other halfe out of the Estate or proper charge of my Executor John Gay my loveing Son according as he have ingaged in his bond to me, in this last matter expressed my Executor is to take the advice of Ens. Richard Ellice and my Son Nathaniel Gay whose advice and determination is fully therein to be attended." In case his wife does not live to need use and full value & principall of what he has given her, then the same shall be equally divided among all his children. Appoints his wife Joannah Gay Executrix and his son John Gay Executor.

Oct. 12, 1696, Mary "Wheelak." She married second, Sept. 20, or Feb. 13, 1726, Cornelius Fisher, born Feb. 8, 1660; died Jan. 6, 1743, being his third wife; she married third, July 16, 1746, Thomas (son of Thomas and Hannah) Bacon, born at Wrentham, Nov. 26, 1693; she died March 25, 1750.*

In the possession of Prof. Park, of Andover, a descendant of Nathaniel Ware, is a deed dated March 2, 1674, from Robert Ware to his son Nathaniel of "Twelve Acres . . . in the Township of Wrentham . . . being a part of the first deuision of Lands Layd out . . for house Lots . . . [abutting] upon the house Lot of son John Ware towards the North East," and of son Robert Ware South West. Also the full Right "of Nine Cow Comon Rights in the

• second devision & all succeeding denisions of all sorts of Lands." The will of Nathaniel² has not been found. His real estate was valued at £240 7. 6. at his death; £359 when the estate was settled two years later.

The lands bought by Nathaniel Ware, senior, were the following: June 9, 1685, 2 acres south of Nuppong Hill; 6: 2: 1670, land adjoining his house lot; 9: 4: 1685, at Mill Brook; same date, 20 acres on Great Plain,* S. on leading way through the Plain, E. adjoining Eleazer Metcalf, W. by Samuel Fisher, N. by Common land. May 21, 1485, a small parcel extending his house lot to the great pond. March 28, 1698, 7 acres at the Great Plain joining the land he bought of Anthony Hancock. Oct. 1, 1716, 1 acre South of Great Hill beyond the Great Hill near Dorchester line. March 28, 1709, 3½ acres at mill brook common, S. & W. on his own land. Oct. 1, 1716, 35 acres at his timber lot at Mill brook, being part swamp and part upland, viz. 21 acres on the West side of the Brook, 14 acres on the East side of the brook.

Nath'l² Ware, Sen., sold to Nath' Ware, Jr., for Twenty-Three pounds 10 shillings, current money of N. E., Several tracts of lands in Wrentham. "One Tract Containing Fourteen Acres and Twenty Pole Lying upon the Great Plain, land formerly granted Sam'l. Shears, Senr., S. 

JOSEPH³ (*John²*), born in Wrentham, June 2, 1681-2; died in Sherborn, Jan. 26, 1754; married Jan. 5, 1708-9, Hannah Wood, daughter of Eliezer² (Nicholas¹) and Dorothy Wood, of Sherborn (born Feb. 11, 1688-9, died March 4, 1754), and removed to the Wood farm in Sherborn. In 1710, with Joseph Morse, he built the first grist mill on Sewall's brook; the privilege is still in the family of Joseph.³ He purchased half the Hull estate from Judith Cooper, daughter of Judge Sewall, and built upon it a house which is still standing. "Capt. Ebenezer Billings through his father became an owner of a large tract of land in Shavon and Foxboro', and it is supposed that he built the first house in the Dorchester New Grant. It was on the road or path to Bristol and Providence, and was kept as a Tavern. His family, five or six sons settled around him, as they became of age. He died Feb. 25, 1717-8. His widow Hannah survived him 12 or 15 years. Ebenezer, his son, seems to have had the homestead and lived with his father; he was b. July 13, 1677, and m. Jerusha —, the time I have not found, recorded. I do not find the record of the birth of but two children: Jerusha, b. Aug. 9? 1705, Zebiah, b. Oct 22, 1711. . . and there may have been others.

Jerusha m. Cornelius Collick (later, Kollock), Sept. 26, 1723, and their son Cornelius was b. 1724, month and day not given. Tradition makes Collick a sea captain, and that he found his future wife in the daughter of the tavern keeper where he stopped on his way across the country from Bristol to Boston." [Newton Talbot. 1888.]

"Capt." ; married Jan. 25, 1726[-7], Priscilla, daughter of "Benj. and Presilia" Grant, born at Wrentham, Dec. 20, 1701. She died May 3, 1788, in 87th year.

The commission of Nathaniel Ware, gentleman, to be Captain of y^e Second Company in the Fourth Regiment, was signed by W. Shirley in 1746. Nathaniel's house in Wrentham was built 1674; repaired 1716. After the notice of a "general muster" at Dedham in 1713 is written in Nathaniel's hand: "Nathaniel Ware jr. was 16 years, 1 month and two days old, and was at said general muster." [E. A. Parks.]

A will of Nathaniel³ is still in existence, dated 1767, but unsigned. He mentions his wife Priscilla, sons Nathaniel, Benjamin, David and Josiah; daughters Mary Haws, Bety Ware, Keziah Everet, Abigail Wight, Beriah Bacon. The legacies which he leaves his children appear (from the above mentioned "Book of Accounts of what he has given to his Children on Portion account, 1752," &c.), to be intended to make up each daughter's portion to "£390 in old Tenor, Equal in Lawfull money to £52." Benjamin's share, £700; David's, £650; Josiah's, £600=£80 lawful money.

After the death of their mother in 1788, Nathaniel, Benjamin and David Ware, Elias Bacon, Joseph Wight and Kezia Everet, widow, agree to settle the estate, although "Josiah Ware and Mary Haws widow are out of the Commonwealth."

Dr. William Ware was admitted to the Norton church from Wrentham in 1734; his wife Anna was admitted 1742. "He bought of John Finney Feb. 19, 1729 the farm now (1858) owned by Sandforth Freeman. . . . He had a liquor dealer's license. Sold his Norton farm Nov. 24, 1753. (Hist. of Norton.) He had "one quarter of a purchase right in Taunton north purchase," "by virtue of a deed dated March 20, 1732 from John Ware, junior, and Mehetabel Ware his wife, the daughter of William Briggs of Taunton." [Account of W. Ware in books of North Purchase Co. in possession of Rev. W. L. Chaffin, N. Easton.]

"I found several deeds from different people to Dr. Wm. Ware, showing that he must have owned a large tract of land in Attleboro and Norton, a large part of which I can identify. There are deeds to him from John Finney, John Hills, Daniel Whipple, Nathaniel Leonard, John Ware, jr., Joshua Barrows, and from him to Geo. Leonard and Ephraim Lane.

The last tract is now in the possession of Caleb S. Wetherell of Norton (a cousin of my mother) who married Cordelia Lane, only child of George and Chloe. She was great granddaughter of Ephraim. Among the original proprietors of Taunton North Purchase, I find the name of Jonathan Briggs, and this made me think that perhaps Wm. Briggs might be one of Jonathan's descendants, so I lost some time looking for a clue in that way. After some time I found a deed from Edward and Esther Andross to Wm. Briggs of Taunton, of land that was formerly Joseph Harvey's (father of Esther Andross) and originally belonging to Christopher Thrasher of Taunton, who was also an original proprietor in T. N. Purchase, and an ancestor of my own, my paternal grandmother having been Sophia Thrasher. This explains how Wm. Briggs became possessed of the land, afterwards deeded by John jr. and Mehitable Ware to William Ware, March 20, 1732. In this deed there is nothing to show how John jr. and Mehitable got this land, but I found another deed from John jr. and Mehitable Ware to George Leonard of Norton, 'of 25 acres of land which was our honoured father's, William Briggs, late deceased.' Dated May 30, 1732.

This shows conclusively that John Jr.'s wife was the daughter of William Briggs of Taunton. This deed was signed as witnesses by John Ware, Mehetabel Ware and Mehetabel Ware, who must have been the father, mother and sister (afterwards Mrs. May) of John Ware Jr.

Also May 3, 1776, John Everett of Wrentham was appointed guardian of Nanny, over fourteen years, Paul, Eleanor, Leonard and Cyrus Ware, all under fourteen years, and children of the late Jonathan Ware of Mansfield." [I. W. Wilcox, March 19, 1887.]

Col. Jonathan Eddy served all through the Old French war as captain in regiments commanded by Col. Winslow, Col. Doty and Col. Frye, in the last of which he raised a company in Mansfield. He served principally in Nova Scotia, and in 1763 removed thither with his family, and settled in Cumberland, (afterwards Sackville, New Brunswick), about 1763. On the outbreak of the Revolution, the Eddys and other Massachusetts men in the Province openly espoused the cause of the rebels, even going so far as to capture a vessel of one hundred tons in the harbor and conveying her with her valuable cargo to Boston. They also made an attack on the well built Fort Cumberland (formerly called by the French " Beau Sejour"). The attack failed, as might have been expected. The reprisals which followed by the royal party in the Province obliged the patriots to flee to the States, leaving their families behind. They reached Machias after a difficult journey of twenty-five days in the wilderness, in the depth of winter. The following spring, as William was returning to the Province to bring away his family, he was recognized by a provincial as he was crossing in an open boat, near Eastport, and shot. Col. Eddy and some of his companions then returned to Mansfield, but removed thence to Sharon in 1781.

"The town of Sharon in that year 'Voted not to receive as an inhabitant any of the persons hereafter mentioned who have come into the town to reside: — Col. Jonathan Eddy and family from Nova Scotia and others.' It was then the custom to pass such a vote to prevent the town from being liable for support of persons coming in." . . . The next year the free-holders of Sharon sent Col. Eddy to the Great and General Court! In 1784 Col. Eddy removed to Township No. Ten, east side of Penobscot river. This township was known later as Eddytown Plantation, and incorporated as the town of Eddington in 1811. In 1801 Congress granted land to refugees from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

On the old map of 1770 the name of N. Ware appears. The farm is now owned by Lauren and John Kingsbury. You will find it on the map at the corner of Webster and High Sts. I am unable to locate the 'Cranberry Meadow'; very likely it was in the Rosemary meadows somewhere. I have marked the 'School ground' on the tracing of the map. It is located between the Colburn and Livingston house on the map. What is known here as 'Powell's Island' is a tract of upland near Charles river, surrounded by meadow. It is covered with wood. 'Shrubie land' is probably the same as Shrubby or scrubby land, and means a small growth of wood. 'Shruff, Light, dog wood, or stuff used for fuel.' [Webster.] I am not sure as to the location of the 'Rosemary Plain Road,' but I do not think that it was what is now Brookside Road. I think that it may have been some one of the roads at the northerly end of the 'Great Playne.' I have traced on the map some of the old roads. I have also marked the route driven over at the time of your visit. Very few of our roads were located as early as 1699. The oldest is undoubtedly the road from Dedham over the island to the 'Great Playne.'" [C. C. Greenwood, Needham, 1887.]

You shall let your boy help sheal the corn and help home with the sheap with your horse and Pung. If you consent to all this we will settle all forwith."
